The Church of England has a programme called "church planting" through which it sends clergy and supporters to re-open churches that have had to close. After continued lobbying from the community led by the HWA, the Bishop has chosen St John's to benefit from this approach. The Church is being made ready and the doors will be open very soon.

Revd. Graham Singh hails originally from Canada. He will be settling with his wife Celine and their little boy in Hampton Wick. He will be joined by Jerry Field, our new curate who has moved to Hampton Wick.

# It's our High Street and we want it back!

Hampton Wick High Street has a serious traffic problem. Everyone who lives on the High Street or who works, shops or visits there knows this.

Outside the rush hour, cars, vans and motor bikes take advantage of short stretches of clear road to accelerate to dangerous and disturbing speeds. At other times there are lorries thundering under the railway bridge and into the High Street. At night these vehicles are often driving well in excess of the speed limit.

#### **High Speed High Street**

Post Office, speeding continues to be a menace in Hampton Wick. That warning sign is: IN THE WRONG PLACE Traffic from the Teddington direction often accelerates in its approach to the railway bridge as it enters the village and goes too fast as it passes the crossing, station and bus stop.

#### After years of HWA campaigning, High Street improvements to reduce speeding finally confirmed by LBRuT

As we reported in our December 2009 edition, the HWA last year persuaded the Council's traffic planning department to introduce some design features into our High Street to reduce speeding, particularly at night. The planning and consultation process was quite lengthy and ran into delays caused by the election in May. However, we are delighted to tell you that Councillor Clare Head (cabinet member for Transport) has now given formal approval to the plans. Work is expected to be complete by the end of October.

The main features include:

A pedestrian refuge in the middle of the High Street near the end of Lower Teddington Road. This will help pedestrians cross to the bus stop as well as reducing speeding.

A traffic island in the High Street near the bottom of Park Road.

Some repositioning of parking spaces to create "bends" in the road, making it harder to speed.

At last we are seeing some positive steps towards making the heart of our village a safer and more pleasant place.

### We won - parking charges scrapped!!

The HWA was an enthusiastic partner in the Keep Bushy Park Free campaign which fought against the proposed introduction of parking charges in our local park. The protest kicked off with a Day of Action in Bushy Park in April 2009 followed by a sustained campaign of petitioning, letter-writing, lobbying press and politicians.

In July of this year, Tourism and Heritage Minister John Penrose announced: "Plans to introduce car parking charges in these parks were the subject of fierce public opposition from the moment they were first proposed, some 18 months ago, and the local MPs have been lobbying me hard so, after discussing it with them and with the Mayor's office, I've decided to scrap the idea."

We recognise the need to raise money to maintain the Park and we'll be supporting the Friends of Bushy & Home Parks in helping identify ways of doing this that are fair to all Park users, the Park and its wildlife.

### **RC Sherriff Blue Plaque - update**

English Heritage have replied positively to our request that they consider the birthplace of R.C.Sherriff (Rossendale, 2 Seymour Road) for a blue plaque (see letter below). It is a long process, but our proposal has passed the first hurdle and been shortlisted for full historical research.

Following our article in the last newsletter, HWA member Mike Adams alerted us to an original R.C.Sherriff letter being auctioned on eBay.com. We have now acquired this letter. It is dated 24<sup>th</sup> December 1929 (the year after Journey's End was published) and was sent from Rossendale to Sewell Stokes Esq. See below for full text of letter.



SHERRIFF I am writing to let you know that English Heritage has considered your suggestion that a blue plaque be erected to R. C. Sherriff in London. I am pleased to tell you that our Blue Plaques Panel was of the opinion that your suggestion warrants careful consideration and that it has been shortlisted for full historical research. This will include detailed investigation into Sherriff's surviving London addresses and their suitability for commemoration. Owing to the popularity of the scheme, and the existence of a long list of pending cases, it may take some time (at least three years) to reach this stage. A report will be submitted to the Blue Plaques Panel as soon as possible, and we will write to you again when a final decision has been reached. If you require any further information in the meantime, then please do not hesitate to contact Libby Wardle (020 7973 3794) or Jane Biro (020 7973 3757). Yours sincerely,

John Cattell Blue Plaques Secretary biographer and playwright. He was 6 years younger than Sherriff - too young to have served in World War I.
